After the ride the Widows sons followed Zef's partner Mirella to his graveside where a wreath was laid and the masonic grand lodge above verse was sung in harmony (was quite weird singing it sober!!). Then we went to Patois Café for some more coffee and cake, well, it would have been rude not to!!



During the ride a collection was taken and over £500 was raised for Grow Limited a Guernsey charity which was supported by the Widows Sons during Lee's time as President.

Over 80 bikers attended the ride and all in all it was a great day out for everyone.

The “Knowledge”

A series of occasional riding tips...

This month: My Road to an IAM RoadSmart Pass, from Michael “Gunny” O’Meara

I’ll be honest, I thought I was better rider than I actually was and I would hazard a guess a lot of bikers are in the same situation I was. But I finally grabbing the bull by the horns and signed up for the IAM RoadSmart course.

I was assigned an observer and arranged my initial assessment ride, and after the admin bits were taken care of, we hit the road. Just over an hour later we finished and then came the bit I had been dreading – the debrief. For anyone who has been riding for a length of time it can be hard to take criticism, but all in all the observer confirmed where I knew I needed help and pointed out some bits I was completely oblivious to.

My observer drew up a plan for how to get me to the required standard and the training started. A bit like ritual, it required more learning and a few pneumonics – ISPGA, POWDDERSS and to be able to recall them and implement them throughout the entire ride.

Attempting to condense the finer details of an advanced riding course into a small article is somewhat tricky, however the fundamentals are based around the acronym IPSCGA, which stands for Information, Position, Speed, Gear and Acceleration. This mantra is used to evaluate what is around you when you are riding and make decisions regarding your speed, gear, positioning on the road as

you ride along – in essence you perform a continuous dynamic risk assessment. So what does IPSCGA stand for?

Information – Study the road ahead and take in any information that it is giving you. Look for pedestrians, the road’s surface, potential hazards such as junctions and use the information to plan your next move. Also provide clear information to other road users so they know what you will be doing.

Position – React to what is happening and move your motorcycle accordingly within your lane for maximum safety. If there is a potential hazard, move away from it, but also position your bike to provide the maximum view through a corner so that you can see a potential hazard as soon as possible.

Speed – Only go as fast as the situation ahead allows, always ensure you can stop if required.

Gear – Rather than stick in one gear, use the bike’s gearbox to give you better acceleration and its engine braking to deliver a smooth ride.

Acceleration – Aim to accelerate smoothly to prevent the suspension overworking and upsetting the bike’s balance by using the bike’s mid-range torque.

Each ride nudged me closer to the my final goal of taking my test, that’s when my observer dangled that “Golden Carrot” in front of my and told me about the “F1rst Pass” which is a faultless exam, achieved by only 2% of all riders in the UK. With a new goal in mind I knuckled down and after a few more rides with my observer I heard the words I had been dreading “It is time”

Check ride book and the second observer signed me off ready – test day here I come. In the meantime, I had found out that my IAM Test Observer was a very well respected ex Metropolitan Police Motorbike rider – No pressure then.

The test day arrived, I cannot stress enough the importance of plenty of rest and to eat properly prior to the exam, or indeed any riding. Bike polished to within an inch of its life (for those who know me that in itself is a miracle) and off I set to the test location followed by my observer. The test itself was fairly straight forward and consisted of a ride lasting about 90 mins and covering about 60 miles. At the end of the test, the examiner asked a number of questions from the highway code – how many types of crossings are there and can you name them ? Finally, the moment of truth – my results, with my heart in my mouth, he begins it was close, my mind goes bugger I failed – he continues but I am pleased to say you have passed and I will be awarding you a “F1rst Pass”



I would seriously ask you to consider taking an advanced course be it IAM or ROSPA. You will never stop learning and who knows you may enjoy yourself throughout the training – I know I did.


A great weekend was had by all, with donations and a raffle we managed to raise a massive £400 for the Big Ride and we very much look forward to more members attending our little rally next year.



11 - 25 JUNE 2022

Wednesday 18th August & the last Natter Night and BBQ before the Big Ride, and it's fair to say there was an air of expectation and apprehension for what we'd all agreed to do.

The new Southern Chapter President Mike (Flat Cap) Haywood presented the organiser of this and all previous Big Rides – Trevor (Claret) Hutcheson with a small token of our appreciation for all the hard work (well a big bottle actually) – with a request to leave it unopened until we get back!



7:15am the next day, Claret was at Kings Court before most of the rest of us, obviously not hungover, so it was clear he'd heeded our advice.

There was a general hubbub of nervous energy as the Chapter and unofficial Ridings representative, Frank Milner, fuelled up with Bacon Baps and Coffee, provided free by the caterers for Kings Court Masonic Centre (Mega thanks Simon).

Remarkably, Frank (a mere 80 years young), rode down from Tingley (South of Leeds) to Peacehaven the night before, so had already travelled 80 miles before the rest of us arrived,

he then travelled all the way up to John O'Groats and back with us... pretty impressive.

Then the dignitaries arrived - the Past PGM for Hampshire and the Isle of Wight – Mike (Ninja PGM) Wilks, shortly followed by the Mayor Of Eastleigh, and the representative of the Hampshire and Isle of Wight Air Ambulance; and all were warmly greeted. An interesting time to present a cheque for last year's ride I hear 7:30 in the morning... ah well, Covid restrictions hampered all previous plans to visit the Helicopter base.

So once assembled, the Mayor of Eastleigh and Mike Wilks assisted in presenting the £10,000 cheque from last year's ride to Natalie of the HIOWAA.



In thanking us, Natalie noted that we were by far the biggest single non corporate contributor to their charity. To be fair, on top of the Bacon Baps (other meat free substitutes are available) and coffee (or Tea in Sprockets case) that was enough to get us to Membury Services without using any fuel.

Special thanks to Past President Francesco for bringing (and taking home) the massive cheque and displaying his leg scaffolding ... and his sexy knees.

So, after the safety briefing by Claret, and with Ninja PGM as second man, the group set off for Membury Services to be joined by the Shires and Stonecutters chapters,

Extra special thanks go to Ninja PGM for riding with us to Membury, especially as he admitted it was touch and go whether he could make it, as it was a bit of a problem getting his leg over.

A pleasant surprise was the arrival of Ian from the North West Chapter to join us, who'd ridden

all the way down from Chorley to ride back up to Runcorn with us.

That's what I call commitment from Frank and Ian – and the pair were damn fine company as well (must be some kind of Northern Trait... just saying).

Although Southern were riding for HIOWAA, The Shires were looking to raise funds for The Thames Valley Air Ambulance, and the Stonecutters main charity is The Loganberry Trust in aid of Prostate Cancer; with each looking to raise in excess of £5k on top of the Southern £10k + for the HIOWAA a Big Ride indeed.

Following the obligatory photo of the Presidents with Ninja PGM and Claret, we said goodbye to Mike Wilks.



At Membury the complete group re-organised itself into 4 logical units, 2 Southern, 1 Shires and 1 Stonecutters, for optimum ride management and safety, so after complementing Sammy on his excellent choice of hair and beard decoration ...



... the Southern pack set off for Wales, to be later followed by The Shires and the Stonecutters.

Once the ride had entered Wales, we were met at Magor services by a contingent from South Wales

Chapter, and another increase in numbers.

Many, many thanks to The President Shaun for the hospitality, history discussion, inter-nation banter, and excellent company all the way to Devils Bridge, where the group took the opportunity to stretch their legs and check out the local transport facilities ...



... and then after a slightly wet photo we left Shaun to return to Newport, and the Riders then set off for Runcorn.

This was the longest segment of the day, and the riders didn't arrive at Runcorn until around 8:30, so just under 12 hours on the road. As usual the weather and traffic completely ruined our timeline so, as the Stonecutters arrived before us, Jamie helpfully received a cheque from the Cheshire WS for the HIOWAA on our behalf.



Thanks Jamie & special thanks to Cheshire for your donation to the Big Ride ... it was gratefully received ... and it will be faithfully applied.

After a quick call to the pub restaurant to keep the kitchen open, a few Stonecutters

and Southern headed off for refreshments. Still in our waistcoats, we were asked what the patches meant and why we were there. Being the most coherent at the time, (and more likely the closest), Fudgie explained it was a charity ride from Southampton (he didn't know where Chandlers Ford was) to John O'Groats.

At least one sensitively cooled Guinness – (and perhaps a half an hour) later, several people turned up at the table and we were given various donations amounting to over £35 for the ride. £2 here £10 there, and a guy in a wheelchair who insisted we take his evening leftovers of £7. Completely mind-boggling generosity, which went towards the Stonecutters fund – a suitable reparation for collecting our cheque for us.

Friday 20th saw a 7:00am start with 480 miles to go before evening refreshments, and the first stop Skelton Lake Services where about 10,000 people from the Ridings Chapter welcomed us. (Well, might be a bit less, but seemed at least 10k).

Once the bikes were parked, the Ridings Chapter presented the “top brass” (their words) of the Mark Master Masons Provincial Grand Lodge with a cheque in the sum of £500.00



to go towards their festival in aid of the MMM Benevolent Fund.

Many thanks to Riding Chapter for including us in your celebration and presentation, and apparently Frank Milner's pseudonym is “Uncle Albert”, can't understand why, because Albert was

a cockney... although it does look as if he's wearing a life jacket.

Mind you with the weather to come – it would've been a good plan.

After the presentation, sixteen brothers of the Ridings Chapter group rode in convoy with

To be fair I was informed by the lovely Geordie lass that although it was the largest piece of cake, it contained the least amount of calories.



So much was our visibility impaired – some of us missed the exit ramp and had an impromptu tour of Glasgow to get back to the hotel.

The travel-weary band gathered into small groups around the dining area for the evening meal, and as usual we were asked about our travels.

The usual "Good Natured Banter" returned to my inability to get helmet and gloves sorted



out in less than ten minutes. Back home at last, all of the Big Riders of the Southern, Shires and Stonecutters Chapters of the Widows Sons Masonic Bikers would like to thank each and every one of all our fabulous Brothers, their friends and their families, as well as the

sponsors and donors for their support, generosity and hospitality on every inch of our ride.

The whole journey and the inclement weather took its toll on the group:

- ~ One saddlebag had to be discarded due to a minor collision.
- ~ One member had to go to hospital overnight as a result of fatigue and dehydration but was back with us in the morning to continue the ride; they make them hardy in Yorkshire.
- ~ Another Brother fell foul of a diesel spill on an uphill hairpin... both bike and rider quickly recovered to continue the ride.
- ~ One rider had to go home without stopping at Glasgow – about a 20 hour day.
- ~ Another brother was knocked off his bike, but the local Widows Sons friendship and fraternal care was there to look after him.
- ~ Gear was hung in wardrobes, dripping with water when waterproofs were overwhelmed.

Although still very much a work in progress, The Southern, The Shires and The Stonecutters Chapters are pleased to report that we expect the Grand Totals for the ride to reach in excess of £20,000

When looking for a strapline for this article, I shared my thoughts with Ninja PGM before the off, who said:

“Well, The Widows Sons combines my two passions ... Freemasonry and Motorcycling”
I couldn't have put it better.

The Children's Hospice South West based in Fremington, North Devon. Little Bridge House, the only children's hospice in the South West, offers sick children and their families respite and relaxation, friendship and a sense of community, a sharing in the 24 hour care and then support for the whole family into bereavement.

The second is St Lukes Hospice based in Plymouth. St Luke's Hospice Plymouth is an independent charity providing specialist advice and support to people with progressive life-limiting illnesses in Plymouth, South West Devon and East Cornwall. We believe that everyone deserves quality end of life care, no matter where. We work with our community, in partnership with others, to achieve dignity, comfort and choice for people affected by life-limiting illnesses through delivering and influencing exceptional care. Our vision is a community where no person has to die alone, in pain or distress. In order to continue our vital work, we need to raise £7.8 million each and every year. Without your support this would not be possible.

The bikers (who are also members of the Widows Sons Masonic Bikers Association) want "The Chicken Run" to raise as much as humanly possible for the two charities. 

The members of the Gibraltar Chapter prepared a welcoming which consisted of an informative tour of 'The Rock', all of its touristic sites and a visit to the 'Gibraltar Masonic Institute' (GMI).



Wbro. Ronald Ignacio PM was instrumental in making the arrangements by providing access to all upper rock tourist sites, including Saint Michael's Cave and the new and impressive Sky Walk. This allowed our visitors to get an insight on the history of Gibraltar.

Gibraltar's Skywalk offers breath-taking 360° views spanning three countries and two continents and links to other sites within the Gibraltar Nature Reserve. This includes the thrilling Windsor Suspension Bridge and the famous Apes' Den via a series of walking trails.

At the GMI, the visiting members were presented by WBro. Anthony Morillo PM with

the History of the Lodge of St. John no 115 (EC).

Tour of Portugal & Spain
